

#### 🛡 JJ HOLLAND PARK

50 Altona Street, Kensington VIC 3031 Completed: 2021

The play space at JJ Holland Park provides a varied play experience within a diverse natural landscape of native meadow and exotic planting. Colourful platform towers create a playful reference to shipping containers which are visible across the park, embedding the play space in Kensington's industrial heritage. A rope climbing dome, swings, slacklining poles and Melbourne's first flying fox provide a fun and challenging play experience that compliments the neighbouring Extreme Sports Precinct.

#### **Activities:**

- Climb to the top of the **platform towers** what can you see?
- Try out the 25m long flying fox or jump on the bouncing mats.
- Bring along your picnic basket and enjoy the BBQ facilities.
- Look for the spiky flower heads of the Kangaroo Grass in spring
- Tie your slackline between the mounting poles and test your balance.



### HAWKE AND ADDERLEY STREET PARK

100 Hawke Street, West Melbourne VIC 3003 Completed: 2018

The Hawke and Adderley Street Park provides much needed open space for the West Melbourne community. The play space responds to the site's sloping terrain through terraced rock, mounds and slides that encourage imagination and adventure across the steep incline. Spinning wheels, sand pits and diggers create a unique and explorative play experience that caters to toddlers and young children. The play space is complimented by several flexible lawn areas for gathering, play and relaxation within the established West Melbourne neighbourhood.

- · Create a fort in the large sand pit.
- · Feel the air under your feet on the swings.
- Pick up speed on the large spinning wheel.
- Make the most of your leisure time with the relaxed open lawn, BBQ facilities and drinking fountain.



## 🛡 NATURE PLAY AT ROYAL PARK

Address: 28 Gatehouse Street, Parkville VIC 3052 Completed: 2015

Nature Play provides an inviting entry to the state-significant Royal Park, Melbourne's largest native parkland. The seven Wurundjeri seasons of Melbourne are central to this new landscape, informing the structure, planting and play experiences of the space. Voted Australia's Best Playground in 2016, the regional play space offers new opportunities for challenging and explorative play and encourages children of all ages and abilities to connect with nature

#### **Activities:**

and each other.

- Forage for twigs and leaves to create a **nature cubby**.
- Test your balance on the challenging rope obstacle course.
- Bring your towels and cool down at the water play plaza.
- · Enjoy a BBQ and picnic on the open lawn areas.
- Hike up the grassy knoll to look across at the city skyline, then roll back down... again and again!

## 🥊 RON BARASSI SENIOR PARK

500 Docklands Drive, Docklands VIC 3008 Completed: 2015

The Ron Barassi Senior Park is located in a unique intersection between Moonee Ponds Creek, Swanston Dock and the underside of the Bolte Bridge. The large soaring tower offers unique views across to the Melbourne skyline. The industrial and maritime character of the large and challenging play space is reflected in reconstructed salvaged bluestone water channels, concrete tunnels and sand bags. Native trees and vibrant flowering vegetation create an imaginative play experience. The park is named in recognition of Ronald James Barassi Senior, who played as a rover for the Melbourne Football Club from 1936 to 1940.

- Climb to the top of the tower and look across to the city skyline.
- Bring your towels and create a river with the water pumps.
- Test your balance on the rope bridge and nets.
- · Bring your favourite snacks to enjoy at the BBQ and picnic area.



## 🕈 SOUTHBANK BOULEVARD PLAY SPACE

Address: Southbank Boulevard, Southbank VIC 3031 Completed: 2022

The Southbank Boulevard play space named 'Rocks on Wheels' provides a variety of play equipment seemingly teetering on wheels and construction material. The huge rocks are playfully placed on fixed trolleys and the seemingly hard bluestone paver base, is discovered to be soft and squishy when stepped on.

The element of 'risk play' allows children to experience and carry out risk assessments in a safe environment, supporting resilience and cognitive abilities.

- Look out for the 'runaway rocks' as you walk along Southbank
- Search for all of the gemstones, toy animals and plants hidden
- Clamber over and amongst the huge bluestone boulders sourced from Port Fairy.



## 🥊 LINCOLN SQUARE

Address: 138-142 Bouverie Street, Carlton VIC 3053 Completed: 2021

Lincoln Square is the site of the oldest public playground in Victoria. The play space creates an imaginative 'treehouse' experience that celebrates the majestic Moreton Bay Fig tree canopies and the site's sloping terrain. Rope bridges, a rainforest floor walk and two elevated timber cabins allow children of all ages and abilities to experience the 150-year-old tree canopies up close. Salvaged City of Melbourne trees have been used to craft a variety of nature play features which are nestled among a host of ferns and rainforest planting.

- Climb to the top of the towers and enjoy being up close to the tree canopies. Can you spot any possums?
- Climb across the rope bridge and slide back down to the ground.
- Keep an eye out for the names of old street trees.
- · Bring your picnic and gather at the shady picnic areas.

With a choice of over 40 play spaces across the city, all ages and abilities are catered for.


