

WELCOME TO THE GREENLINE PROJECT


The Greenline Project will turn the city towards the Yarra River - Birrarung. It will promote the health of the river and our community.

A wide and welcoming public walkway will line the river's edge between Birrarung Marr and Docklands.

The Yarra River - Birrarung will be managed as a living entity, connecting habitat zones for plants and animals.

The riverfront will feature diverse and exciting parks, activities, experiences and cultural connections.

The Greenline Project outlines concepts for **five interconnected precincts**





1 BIRRARUNG MARR PRECINCT

The promenade begins in the Birrarung Marr Precinct. Here, we celebrate Aboriginal culture and Melbourne's unique ecology.

Activities

- Look east along the river towards the Swan Street Bridge and visualise a Fig Tree Boardwalk extends over the riverbank, below the trees with places where you can sit in the shade beside the water
- Admire the Birrarung Wilam (Common Ground) artworks; a collaborative art piece that celebrates the physical and spiritual connections between Aboriginal people and place.
- Travel west along Flinders Walk, where the former Williams
 Creek flowed into the Yarra River Birrarung. Visualise a elevated
 walkway that will create more space for people and nature. It
 improves your safety and access over the river near Flinders
 Street Station, while regenerating the natural river's edge below.



2 THE FALLS PRECINCT

The Falls Precinct centres on the location of the old waterfall and crossing in the Yarra River - Birrarung. It holds cultural value for the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung and the broader Kulin Nations. It also marks the founding location of Melbourne.

Activities:

- Find your way to Banana Alley and take notice of the historic Banana Alley vaults were once used to store and ripen bananas for sale. Now you will visit for its bars, restaurants and public happenings. In front of the vaults, the promenade will connect you to the riverside habitat and activities such as boat hire.
- Take a moment to pause at the Queens Bridge. Before 1883, a
 waterfall in this location marked the meeting of salt water from
 Port Phillip Bay and fresh water of the Yarra River Birrarung.
- Stand amongst the scar trees of the artwork Scar: A Stolen Vision, at Enterprize Park. Are you familiar with their story? You can learn more about this and other key places of Aboriginal cultural and historical significance via the QR code on the opposite side of this brochure.
- Look out across the river to the first of three **Trial Floating Wetlands**.

RIVER PARK PRECINCT

River Park Precinct is an open space next to the river, which will become a place for both rest and play.

Activities:

- Discover the unique artwork Chimney in Store in Batman Park.
 This piece reflects on the complex meanings of the treaty John Batman signed with Wurundjeri people in 1835. Invalid under both Kulin and Crown law, the so-called treaty precipitated invasion and dispossession in Port Phillip, and the establishment of Melbourne.
- Explore the built forms within and surrounding Batman Park, such as the railway viaduct at the northern boundary of the park. Visualise how people could use these spaces differently in the future.



4 MARITIME PRECINCT

With its wharves, goods shed and heritage-listed Mission to Seafarers building, Maritime Precinct reveals the city's rich maritime history. It links the central city precincts of the Greenline Project with Melbourne's Docklands.

Activities:

- Find your way to the historic Mission to Seafarers building on Flinders Street. Here there is opportunity to learn about Melbourne's maritime heritage and to enjoy food, drink, exhibitions and events.
- From the Mission to Seafarers, travel through the future Seafarers Rest Park back to the river, and walk west along the wharf to **Jim Stynes Bridge.** Here you will see a landscape which achieves balance for pedestrians and cyclists, between elegant architectural forms and riverine planting.
- Venture acros the Webb Bridge to where you can see the second Trial Floating Wetland site installed by the City of Melbourne.



5 SALT WATER WHARF PRECINCT

The Salt Water Wharf Precinct reveals the Yarra River - Birrarung as it becomes broader, alive with private and commercial boats. The wide promenade links Victoria Harbour and Collins Landing with an ecological headland park at the end of North Wharf.

Activities:

- Explore the award winning Library at the Dock, a community facility developed in a three-way partnership between the City of Melbourne, Development Victoria and Lend Lease.
- Look north from Victoria Harbour Promenade to the third Trial Floating Wetland site. Can you see any birds using this space?
- Enjoy the offerings of **Buluk Park** and its adjoining hospitality venues.
- Please note that parts of the Salt Water Wharf precinct are not publicly accessible due to ongoing development.

'Get to Know the Greenline Project' is your opportunity to explore the Yarra River - Birrarung's north bank, and to learn more about this city-shaping opportunity.

'Get to Know The Greenline Project' is your opportunity to learn more about the City of Melbourne's plan to create 4 kilometres of interconnected promenades and open spaces, and renew the natural river edge between Birrarung Marr and the Bolte Bridge.

Start your journey at Birrarung Marr's and walk west along the river to Dockland's Buluk Park. Notice how the public spaces along the north bank connect to each other. How close are you to the water? What works well? What could be improved?

As a major city-shaping project, the Greenline will rely upon partnerships with Traditional Custodians, government, agencies, and other key stakeholders. The transformation of the north bank into an inspiring waterfront in the heart of Melbourne also has a role to play in boosting the local economy, forming a vital link between the central city and the Yarra River - Birrarung for generations to come.
